A NOTE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The past year has been one of tremendous growth for our organization. I am humbled that you, our donors, our Board of Directors, and Washington Township Schools have allowed for this expansion in both impact and structure.

During fiscal year 21-22 the Washington Township Schools Foundation increased our total assets by 8% to over \$5 million and increased our support to the district by 25% to over \$600,000. We also began implementation of our 3-year strategic plan and added two new positions to support our efforts!

This report proudly shares with you the details on the value of that growth and its impact on our community. This publication also marks the last under The Advancement Center name. We are excited to usher in our next chapter as the Washington Township Schools Foundation as we celebrate the accomplishments you made possible this past year.



HELPING TO BRIDGE THE GAP

WTSF works alongside Washington Township Schools to bring their strategic goals to life by supporting programing that helps to bridge the education gap many school districts face. Below are a few of the ways we have supported the district this year. Scan the QR code to see MSDWT's strategic goals.

IN 2021-22, \$112,596 IN GRANT FUNDING SUPPORTED:



PARTNERING WITH MSDWT TO MEET THEIR STRATEGIC GOALS

FUNDING FOR PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT INCLUDED:

- Restorative practices training
- Social-emotional learning training
- De-escalation and crisis prevention and intervention
- Culturally responsive teaching and anti-racist pedagogy
- Reducing implicit bias and racial inequities

OTHER EQUITY FOCUSED SUPPORT

- Financial support for expanded Naviance technology to help support teams with student goal measuring.
- Monthly meetings with community partners to identify funding, volunteering, and mentoring opportunities.
- Additional funding and financial agency for ongoing DE&I grants and programs in MSDWT.

WHAT WE DO

CLASSROOM & STAFF SUPPORT

Classroom and Professional Development Grants: This year we provided \$121,777 to fund 58 staff grants. Grants awarded supported STEM, Performing Arts, Literacy, Neuroscience, Equity & Access, Physical Health & Wellness, and English as a New Language.

Donorschoose.org: \$33,000 was provided as a match for any Washington Township teacher placing an eligible request on Donorschoose.org. Donor support from around the world leveraged the match to complete 155 MSDWT classroom appeals.

Adopt-A-Classroom: MSDWT community partners, Northminster Presbyterian, St. Luke's United Methodist, and Second Presbyterian, provided \$33,000 to support needs in 33 elementary school classrooms.

Teacher Support: A generous donation from The Brooks and Joan Fortune Family Foundation provided teachers in MSDWT with a membership to Teachers Treasures (\$25 value) for the 2021-2022 school year, allowing them to secure \$205,803 worth of student and classroom supplies free of charge.

STUDENT SUPPORT & ENRICHMENT

BizTown: This year WTSF provided \$3,000 to help ensure each student from participating MSDWT 4th and/or 5th grade classrooms had an opportunity to participate in this immersive experience in financial literacy.

Back to School Supplies: On top of the \$33,000 already provided for Adopt-A-Classroom, our MSDWT community partners, Northminster Presbyterian, St. Luke's United Methodist, and Second Presbyterian, provided \$45,878 in additional support to provide school supplies to students across the district.

IB/AP Support: Our College Credit Endowment provided \$4,072 to subsidize Advanced Placement testing fees. This annual resource makes the exams accessible to a broader base of students than would otherwise be possible.

PantherQuest: WTSF provides \$10,000 annually to train student facilitators as well as support the orientation of incoming North Central freshman in order to help ease their transition to high school.

SCHOOL & PROGRAM SUPPORT


Advancement VIA Individual Determination (AVID): \$5,095 of endowment support assisted the AVID program in working with middle and high school students on expectations, access, and rigger to close the opportunity gap.

Panther Pathways: WTSF provided \$58,830 to help fund an expanded counseling approach to better support MSDWT students successfully navigating the complexities of life after graduation.

Diversity, Equity, & Inclusion Support: MSDWT's current strategic plan focuses on providing more resources to promote DE&I in our schools and WTSF continues to support efforts that align to this goal. See page 2 for more details.

Designated Gifts: WTSF helped donors to support \$360,961 in projects and programming accross the district that answered targeted needs in our schools by earmarking their donation to fund specific efforts.




Kids Can Code with Robots



Hands on learning is a great way to enhance the classroom experience and help students engage in learning. Your generous gifts are helping Steve Auslander do just that for his students. Through funding from a WTSF classroom grant, Mr. Auslander was able to purchase eight Spheros Bolt robots that he now uses as part of his coding curriculum. Not only do these robots help to engage students when coding, but they also help provide a functional understanding of key math concepts as students apply their knowledge of angles, geometry, computation, decimals, and so much more.

BizTown

BizTown, operated by Junior Achievement USA, combines in-class learning with a day-long visit to a simulated town where students can engage in true to life experiences that help them better connect the dots between what they learn in school and the real world. This popular program allows elementary school students to operate banks, manage restaurants, pilot a plane, write checks, and even vote for mayor. During their time at BizTown, students are able to connect with the roles we play as citizens, workers, and consumers in our community. Each year, your donations help ensure that every 4th and/or 5th grade student across the district have an opportunity to participate.



AVID

AVID is a national program that provides extra support to students who need it by helping accelerate and enhance the work that is already happening in the classroom. For MSDWT, AVID serves as a tool in efforts to close the opportunity gap for students. For one period a day, students receive additional academic, social, and emotional support that will help them succeed in their school's most rigorous courses. WTSF supports expanded access for middle and high school students in MSDWT to this impactful resource as well as giving staff an opportunity for professional development through the training and guidance this program provides.




REUNION SUPPORT






FINANCIAL SNAPSHOT 2021-2022

NEW ENDOWMENTS

Endowments provide important foundational support and long-term stability to nonprofit organizations. Due to the commitment of our visionary donors, we currently oversee 41 endowed funds, all set up to provide ongoing benefit to the MSDWT community. We had several noteworthy endowment creations and expansions during 2021-2022.

Morrie & Jan Maurer Endowment to Further Promising Careers

Established through a generous gift from Morrie (NCHS '69) and Jan (NCHS '73) Maurer to provide a minimum of \$15,000 annually to support an expanded counseling and career exploration/preparation framework for students in MSDWT.

Ginny Hacker & Terry Kahn Grants Fund

Originally established to honor Ginny Hacker, a \$500,000 gift from the estate of Terry Kahn will provide an additional \$25,000 in grant support annually.

Devyn Marie Williams Memorial Fund

Established in the memory of 2021 Northerner Editor, Devyn Marie Williams (NCHS '21), the fund will provide annual North Central High School yearbook support.

Joyce Click Vocal Instruction Endowment

Honoring the retirement of NCHS Choir Director, Joyce Click, the fund will provide vocal instruction enrichment for traditionally underserved students.
